Circular Keys Chorus (for OzChords Chorale, August 2021)

2021 is turning into another year of finding silver linings in clouds that just won't blow away. And we're getting better and better at it. Over the years, CKC members have always enjoyed the warmth and energy of each other's company while creating beautiful harmonies together. But in the last 18 months, this special group of like-minded women has become a symbol of strength and resilience for its members, and a weekly anchor point of dependability while so many 'normal' activities are in suspended animation.

The year got off to a great start, after all the disruptions and cancelled events of last year. For the first couple of months we were only permitted to sing outdoors due to social distancing rules, but it was thrilling to hear ourselves again in live surround-sound after so many months of listening to each other via a modem signal. By March we were back up on the risers in the rehearsal room. Unfortunately, our good fortune was short lived, and by June we had returned to the new normal of computer screens and virtual meeting rooms.

It's now August, and the covid restrictions in Sydney are tighter than ever – but our ability to innovate has come a long way since our first introduction to Zoom meetings last year. Under the inspired leadership of Vicki Dwyer (Master Director) and the ingenuity of our management and music teams, we're continuing to practice our vocal skills, rehearse the existing repertoire and even learn new songs. DID YOU KNOW? FUN FACTS ABOUT SOME OF OUR SONGS

BELIEVE

- was recorded by American singer and actress Cher for her twenty-second studio album *Believe* (1998)
- features a pioneering use of the audio processing software Auto-Tune to distort Cher's vocals, which was widely imitated and became known as the "Cher effect".
- topped the charts of Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, the Republic of Ireland, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and the United States.
- earned Cher a place in the Guinness Book of World Records
 as the oldest female solo artist to top the Billboard Hot 100
 chart and became the highest-selling single by a solo female artist in the United Kingdom.
- is one of the best-selling singles, with sales of over 11 million copies worldwide.
 Reviewers praised its production and catchiness and named it one of Cher's most important releases. It was nominated for the Grammy Award for Record of the Year and won Best Dance Recording.
- is credited for restoring Cher's popularity and cementing her position as a pop culture icon, with lyrics describing empowerment and self-sufficiency after a painful breakup.
- A demo version written by Brian Higgins, Matthew Gray, Stuart McLennen and Timothy Powell, circulated at Warner Records for months. According to producer Mark Taylor, "everyone loved the chorus but not the rest of the song". Warner chairman Rob Dickins asked the production house Dreamhouse to work on the song. Taylor said their goal was to make a Cher dance record without alienating her fans. Two more writers, Steve Torch and Paul Barry, joined and completed a version that Dickens and Cher were happy with."
- Though not credited as a songwriter, Cher contributed the lines 'I need time to move on, I need love to be strong / I've had time to think it through and maybe I'm too good for you".
 According to Cher, "I was singing [the song] in the bathtub, and it seemed to me the second verse was too whiny. It kind of pissed me off, so I changed it. I toughened it up a bit."
- CKC is lucky to have an original arrangement by our very own Director, Vicki Dwyer to learn and bring to life.
- Luckily, when we get to perform this song our costume will not be what Cher wore when performing "Believe" on the Dressed to Kill Tour in 2014. (see photo for reference)



TRUE COLOURS

- written by American songwriters Billy Steinberg and Tom Kelly.
- it was both the title track and the first single released from American singer Cyndi Lauper's second album. It was the only original song on the album that Lauper did not help to write.
- Released late in the summer of 1986, the song was a major hit for Lauper, spending two
 weeks at number one on the Billboard Hot 100, becoming her last single to occupy the
 top of the U.S. chart. It received a Grammy Award nomination for Best Female Pop
 Vocal Performance.
- Billy Steinberg originally wrote "True Colors" about his own mother. Tom Kelly altered the
 first verse and the duo originally submitted the song to Anne Murray, who passed on
 recording it, and then to Cyndi Lauper. Their demo was in the form of a piano-based
 gospel ballad like "Bridge over Troubled Water". Cyndi completely dismantled that sort of
 traditional arrangement and came up with something that was breathtaking and stark.
- reached number one on the Billboard Hot 100 on October 25, 1986. It also peaked at number three in Australia and New Zealand, and number 12 on the UK Singles Chart.
- became a standard in the gay community. In various interviews, Cyndi elaborated that
 the song had resonated with her because of the recent death of her friend, Gregory
 Natal, from HIV/AIDS. Years later, Lauper co-founded the True Colors Fund, a non-profit
 organization dedicated to eradicating LGBTIQA+ youth homelessness.

DON'T RAIN ON MY PARADE

- is a popular song from the 1964 stage musical Funny Girl. It was also featured in the 1968 movie version of the musical.
- the phrase 'rain on (my) parade' is an idiom that means to have one's enjoyable time be ruined by something, such as hearing disappointing news. In the context of the show, Fanny Brice, a rising star of Broadway meets and falls in love with Nicky Arnstein a professional gambler and con-man. The song tells of her determination to marry Nicky, regardless of his gambling past.
- written by Bob Merrill and Jule Styne. Both the movie and stage versions feature Barbra Streisand performing the song.
- In 2004 it finished No. 46 in AFI's 100 Years...100 Songs survey of top tunes in American cinema
- There was a reprise version of the song in the stage show with alternate lyrics that was cut from the film, which Nicky sings to Fanny after he decides to divorce her.

TEXT ME MERRY CHRISTMAS

- released on November 17, 2014 and performed by Straight No Chaser and Kristen Bell.
- was written by Adam Schlesinger and David Javerbaum to convey "how informal communication has become", touching on a common theme for Christmas music, that of being apart.
- Upon release, Billboard called the tune both "catchy" and "goofy". Within three days of its release, the official YouTube video had garnered 1.7 million views. The song reached #56 on the Billboard Holiday 100 chart on December 19, 2014.




TITANIUM

- a song by French DJ and music producer David Guetta, featuring vocals by Australian recording artist Sia.
- written by Sia, David Guetta, Giorgio Tuinfort and Afrojack. Production was also handled by Guetta, Tuinfort and Afrojack.
- initially released for digital download on 8 August 2011, as the first of four promotional singles from David Guetta's album, Nothing but the Beat. It was later released as the album's fourth single in December 2011. The song originally featured the vocals of American recording artist Mary J. Blige, whose version of the song leaked online in July 2011.
- "Titanium" is a pop song which draws from the genres of house and urban-dance. The
 song's lyrics are about inner strength. Critics were positive towards the song and noted it
 as one of the standout tracks from the album. Sia's vocals received comparisons to those
 of Fergie and the song was also musically compared to Coldplay's work.
- attained top 10 positions in several major music markets, including Australia, Austria, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland and the United States. In the United Kingdom, it peaked at number one, becoming Guetta's fifth number-one single on the chart and Sia's first.
